During our midyear Board of Directors meeting the Board voted to pass 50% of the NMRA subsidy through to the divisions provided that they (1) send their newsletters to all members and (2) include a double sided page of regional information. We approved a modified

(1) the region's convention account and (2) the 2000 convention proceeds CD.

Treasurer Larry Altbaum will analyze the projected income and expenses and present the modified budget to the BOD at our November 18 midyear meeting in Santa Cruz. Larry and I are con-

cerned that while we supposedly would receive \$2 per year for each NMRA member it turns out that we only receive 50 cents for each member who purchased life membership before NMRA switched to an actuarial dues calculation. We must send the Branch Line that costs about \$1 per copy to every member at least once a year.

We believe NMRA should provide the full amount for every member

and cut expenses elsewhere. The Board voted to have Larry and me draft a resolution to that effect and instructed us to ask Ray deBlieck to present it to the NMRA BOD at the Philadelphia convention.

Only about 10% of the membership budget which relies on interest from cast ballots during the recent elec-

> tion for division directors - not surprising as all four candidates were unopposed. There were three write in ballots for the inactive Hawaii Division--one of whom apparently lives elsewhere. He is not on the (long time) friends listing of the 28 members who live

> > in that state. About 60% (18) of them live on Oahu. I will write to the three persons who received votes and encourage them to organize the division.

As President Gene Mayer notes in his article in the issue, we continue to lose friends and members to "the last train leaving the depot". Mortality is not really a model railroad topic but it is something we all face. When we first get interested in the hobby it is as a model train operator, or a model builder, or a rail fan or historian desiring to capture a part of the prototype in our own living spaces. Most of us end up as collectors, which is not bad but it is reality.

We all should make some provision for our "collection" now, because one never knows ahead of time when our "last train" will be called. While what we have collected has great value to us, it will probably be something that is in the way when we go. Our families will want to make some arrangements for this material they know they will never use. Having been asked to help dispose of the model railroad equipment of several friends, both those departed and a few who are alive but have dropped out of the hobby, I have some thoughts on this. First, when asked for help with this we all naturally want to do our best but ask any one who has stepped up to this task and it is often the "call from hell". Properly disposing of a lifetime collection is daunting and can drain a whole lot of your hobby time and energy.

If you have not already made provisions for your

"stuff" I urge you to do so <u>now</u>. It might be included in a will, which makes it clear how you want it to be used. It might be informing those who are close to you what you would like to have done with your railroad material. Just make sure you have talked to the people you expect to carry out these directions and don't assume telling one person will make it happen, they may pre-decease you!

One possible alternative is to donate your collection to your Club, Division or the Region. This is a way you can financially help your organization and be confident your collection will end up in the hands of fellow modelers who value it. In a way, you can turn what might be a burden for your friends and family into a legacy of sorts, reflecting your support of our hobby. Recently I have been involved in gifts of this type to both Coast Division and PCR. These gifts will materially help both these organizations through some bumpy economic times.

By doing this, your "collection" can do some real good and it is a whole lot better than having it stored in boxes in the garage and perhaps some day being put out at a garage sale or even worse, ending in a land fill. Please don't wait until "next week" to address this issue.

The John Allen Award is the most prestigious recognition in PCR. While the award is sponsored by Coast Division, the recipient is chosen by a committee composed of all prior recipients. Chairman, Coast Division Nominations Chairman and handled the Coast Auction bid cards for five years. Dwayne also served as PCR Nominating and Ballot Committee Chairman. Dwayne is an O scale modeler and has been Assistant Chairman for many "O Scale West" meets. He served on the 1981 and 2000 NMRA National Convention Committees and has worked on a number of PCR Convention Committees. I consider Glenn Beier of Placerville, CA to be one of the really great documenters of western railroads through photography. While the depth of his work that School and regularly visited John's homes in the Mon-I have been exposed to is not as vast as some of his contemporaries, the artistic and human qualities are unsurpassed. This book is composed entirely of Glenn's photographic work, all of it in black and

tions to each Chapter and well written captions. Actually, the photography is so well done and so engaging, this would be a wonderful story without any written material.

The book contains 12 chapters, mostly organized by railroad. All the railroads featured are western roads and since that has become my area of fascination in the hobby, this material

really hit home. Covered railroads include the Southern Pacific, Sierra Railroad, West Side Lumber Company, Pickering Lumber Company, Feather River Railway, Sacramento Northern, Carson & Colorado Railway, Denver & Rio Grand Western Narrow Gauge and the Hillcrest Lumber Co. Each of the above has a chapter dedicated to it. There is also a chapter that includes photos from the Nevada Northern, Magma Arizona Railroad and South Lumber Mills (Flagstaff, Arizona), and a chapter called "Shooting Stars" of both behind the scenes and publicity photos Glenn took of movie making on the Sierra.

The final chapter is of special interest to modelers.

Glenn was a friend of John Allen, had been inspired by John's modeling and photography while still in Art terey area. It turned out that John, a photographer by profession, had attended the same institute. John was very particular about letting anyone else photograph his layout and Glenn was one of the very few allowed white. The text in the book is limited to short introducto do so. > John's wonderful work I had never seen and in at least three of the photos there appears a Heisler lettered for Glenn's Angels Camp and Tuttletown HO model railroad.

ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAM

Continuing our discussion on the various AP certificates, this month we will talk about the requirements for the Master Builder - Structures. Like the other certificates, the actual requirements for this category are available on the Internet at the NMRA site. You can also get a copy of the requirements by calling me.

A number of different types of models qualify as structures, including all types of buildings, factories, bridges, cranes, ships, etc. The basic requirement for the Master Builder - Structures certificate is to build twelve (12) structures with at least six different types of structures represented. (The intent of the requirement for different structures is to encourage the individual to model a variety of structures.) A brick building and a wood building would qualify as different types of structures as would a station and a water tank, even if both of the latter were built from wood.

There are a few qualifications for the twelve structures. First, one of the six types must be a bridge or trestle. Note that this bridge does not need to be a major structure but can be a simple bridge over a creek or even a vehicle bridge. If you don't need a bridge on your layout, you can build the bridge as a separate model.

Next, each of the twelve structures must be super-detailed with either commercial or scratch built parts. "Super-detailed" means that it has considerably more detail than usually expected. Some "more expensive/ extensive" kits (such as the Finescale line) could meet this qualification, as long as craftsmanship is shown in assembly of the kit. Otherwise, look at the prototype and include in your model the details that you normally see in prototype buildings, including signs, electrical fixtures and meters, rafter tails, window details, etc.

In addition to being super-detailed, at least six of the twelve models must be scratch built. Note that you

can use commercial scribed styrene or wood and still meet the requirement for a scratch built model. Finally, you must score at least 87½ points on six of the twelve models. This can be via a PCR or Coast Division model contest or by having the models judged for a Merit Award.

To summarize these qualifications, you need to build twelve super-detailed structures representing at least six different types of structures including at least one bridge or trestle. At least six of these structures must be scratch built. Finally, you must score at least 87½ points on at least six of the structures.

Once you complete these requirements, you can submit a Statement of Qualifications that identifies the models and the commercial parts used, etc. The easiest way to do this is to simply attach the model contest form, which includes this information and also documents your score. Send the completed form to your Divisional AP representative, along with a photocopy of your NMRA membership card and you are on your way toward another certificate!

If you have completed all of these requirements, you submit a Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) along with a photocopy of your NMRA membership card and you are on your way toward another certificate!

I am happy to announce that John MacDougall has been awarded an AP certificate for Model Railroad Author. Congratulations!

In addition, Marlin Costello has been awarded his certificate for Master Builder Motive Power. This last certificate qualified him for Master Model Railroader and he was honored as Master Model Railroader No. 368 at the just-completed PCR Convention on in Sacramento. Marlin qualified for a Golden Spike award in February 1998 and used that as inspiration to work his way through the Achievement Program. He was awarded AP Certificates for Electrical, Civil,

International Raifair will be here before you know it, on November 11 and 12, 2006, so mark your calendars now

This will be the Thirtieth Anniversary of one of the biggest and best model railroad shows in northern California, if not the entire West. This annual show in Roseville fills all the Placer County fairgrounds exhibit halls and their annexes, and spills over to several outside activities and exhibits. Hours will be Saturday 10 AM to 5:00 PM, and Sunday 10AM to 4:00 PM. Admission by donation, \$6.00, kids under 12 free. Parking \$1.00.

We're expecting at least 13 American and European style model railroad layouts in scales from Nn3, to indoor and outdoor LGB, and live steam. We also expect to have an operating handcar from the California State Rairoad Museum, offering free rides. There will be a small kid powered wooden train set for the toddlers, with chairs nearby to give parents a break. We're also expecting over 50 vendors offering new and used model railroad related items for sale.

This event has been Sierra Division's main fund raiser each year. We share sponsorship with three other model railroad clubs. The Sacramento Valley Live Steamers will be there with their portable track, and will offer train rides for \$1.00. HIGHLIGHTS **BOARD OF DIRECTORS & ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETINGS MAY 2006**

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS met on May 3 at the DoubleTree Hotel in Sacramento, which was the first day of the PCR Annual Convention "River City Express." Board members present were President L.E. "Gene" Mayer, Vice-President Dave Connery, Treasurer Larry Altbaum, Secretary Rich Kolm, Directors Kermit Paul (Coast), Doug Wagner (Daylight), and Jim Long (Sierra), and Directorproxy Gus Campagna for Ron Plies (Redwood Empire). Also present were Ray deBlieck, Director on the NMRA Board, and various Department Managers and Committee Chairpersons.

- Connery presented a statement of Purpose and Objectives to help guide PCR as it moves forward under the new NMRA organization. The intent is to have a strong program of activities to retain members, which in turn will support an organized effort to bring in new members. The Board adopted the statement of Purpose and Objectives, which will become a preamble in the Manual of Operations.
- Improved communications and sharing the NMRA dues rebate. The first issue of the Branch Line each year is sent to every PCR member, and the other three issues go only to members who subscribe through their NMRA dues. Region contact with all members at least four times per year is very important. Gus Campagna, Manager of the Publications Department, proposed a comprehensive plan to send PCR news to all members through the Division newsletters. After considerable discussion, the Board adopted a program in which the Division editors will be asked to add two pages of Regional news (two sides of one sheet) to their newsletters during each of the last three quarters of the year. The Publications Department will prepare and furnish the copy in coor- Convention Department, reported on planning and dination with the Division editors. In exchange, PCR will distribute 50% of the annual NMRA dues rebate to the Divisions. PCR currently gets \$2.00 per year for each year-to-year and actuarial life member and \$0.50 for each non-actuarial life member.

- **Budget for fiscal year 2006.** Treasurer Larry Altbaum presented a proposed Budget which was approved by the Board with the addition of sharing the NMRA dues rebate with the Divisions for publication of Regional news and interest income from the 21st Century Convention account. He pointed out the large disparity in the amount of annual dues rebated by NMRA (see paragraph above). President Mayer will address this disparity through the Regional Advisorv Council.
- Election of Division Directors. Jim Providenza. Chairperson of the Ballot Committee, reported • Purpose and Objectives. Vice-President Dave that Doug Wagner and Kermit Paul were re-elected in Daylight and Coast Divisions, and Jim Long and Gus Campagna were elected in Sierra and Redwood Empire Divisions. There were three write-in votes in the Hawaiian Division, which has no active organization. This will be reviewed for resolution at the next Board meeting.
 - Appointments. President Gene Mayer announced the appointments of Doug Wagner as Manager of the Membership Department and Ron Plies as Chairperson of the Membership Promotion Committee. He also will appoint a Chairperson of the interim Nominations Committee to seek and evaluate candidates for the upcoming election of President and Vice-President. [It was reported later that Bill Kaufman accepted the appointment.]
 - MMRs. Kermit Paul. Director from Coast Division, announced that Jack Verducci and Marvin Costello are each receiving the Master Model Railroader award.
 - Conventions. Dennis Stokely, Manager of the preparations for the 2007 Convention "Sun Tan Special" in Santa Cruz. He said he is looking for chairpersons and proposals for PCR conventions in the Coast Division in 2009 and in the Redwood Empire

Division in 2010. Chairperson John Houlihan presented his proposal for the 2008 Convention "Sierra Memories" in Fresno, which was accepted by the Board

- Changes to Contest Directory. Bill Scott, Manager of the Contest Department, presented changes to the Contest Directory, which were approved by the Board. The changes are necessary to make the Directory consistent with last year's amendments to the PCR Manual of Operations.
- Disposal of items from the Heinsohn estate. Vice-President Dave Connery reported that items received from the Keith Heinsohn estate were inventoried. Bob Warner, Chairperson of this 2006 Convention, commented about the various convention activities and said there was a total of 235 registrants. He thanked the Committee for their hard work in making it a success. Kevin Hurley, Chairperson for the 2007 Convention in Santa Cruz, described the program for "Sun Tan Special." The next Annual Business Meeting will be at the 2007 Convention.

This February, after 8 years, Kim first steamed up his 2.5" scale RGS #41; #41's website is http:// The MSVRR is in the forwww.projectrgs41.org/ mer REA bldg, next to the Salinas Amtrak Station. Outside the club next to the Amtrak Main, I saw #41 burning coal & pulling a D&RGW Gon, Flat & Boxcar up and back on 100 feet of temp 7.5" gauge track. Also outside are SP 0-6-0 #1237, an SP caboose restoration, plus other SP artifacts in good condition, well protected by a chain link fence.

Inside, the club is adding large expansions, while still operating DCC HO trains, as Monthly Open Houses are required for their occupancy. Much scenery is done, some areas are being framed; parts of MSVRR are in all stages of layout construction: by May will be a lot more. Also inside the club is a display case containing most of what is left of John Allen's Gorre & Daphetid RR. I saw 3 of John's NMRA First Place Awards, some tenders, freight & passenger cars, parts of trestles and two main control panels, all variously damaged from the fire/smoke, all very lovingly salvaged and displayed. Tales of the Santa Cruz Northern

Cut Apart Again...

It seems that every so often I report that the Santa Cruz Northern is once again "No longer 90 or 100% complete". Of course it never really is, I just sometimes like to think so. Sometimes I'm talking about changes in scenery or structures, but not often. Those sorts of things are usually incremental, or if not, do not really affect the ability of the railroad to continue to operate. Other changes are more major...

At the beginning of the summer the Maintenance of Way crew (otherwise known at the Northern California Nameless Group Round Robin or NCNGRR) received orders to rebuild the east and west switches at Doughertys and install two new switches into parts of the Beroldingen Lumber mill there. Each switch has its own story, it seems.

The east switch at Doughertys has moved twice in the last 10 years, each time shifting 3 or 4 actual feet "east" as the siding at Doughertys has grown. Doughertys is now the longest siding on the railroad and can hold a train consisting of three units and 25 cars. It is used regularly during op sessions for meets and passes. Unfortunately, the current location of the east switch has put it physically out on the top, exposed level of the helix, sitting directly on the Masonite hardboard subroadbed. It is a handlaid switch and every spike hole is predrilled through the ties and into the hardboard with a #73 drill chucked in my Dremel Mototool. No quite as painful as it sounds, but not as easy as working with Homasote! Of course, the latest version of the east switch ended up having some geometry problems... It is a curved switch and the radii were never quite as smooth as they should be... and it seems there was this issue of cross-elevation... and maybe there is a hump in the track on the siding just past the frog... the performance was acceptable over the long run.

Well, we took it down to the hardboard, got out the level and a long straight edge, and spent several

Thursday evenings just getting a subroadbed that was truly level. Morgan has spent another several evenings spiking down a new set of rails; looking down the rails is now a pleasure! One more evening should have it back in working order. Operation will be vastly improved!

The west switch also suffered from a geometry problem, but over the years since I originally built it I could never really diagnose the problem. The inside radius is a minimum of 26.5", the minimum mainline radius, but we could never successfully run the Perishable with its pig trailers through the diverging route. The west switch is handlaid and curved like its counterpart at the other end of the siding, but unlike the east switch which is out in the open and easily accessible, the points of the west switch are within an inch of the east portal of Tunnel No. 3. At least it is next to the aisle! I decided since we had taken the east end out of service and were cutting into the main to install switches into Beroldingen I would also totally rebuild the west switch. This was also a good opportunity to relay the rest of the main through Doughertys with code 83 rail to help distinguish the main from the siding and from some of the code 55 rail in Beroldingen Lumber.

So, out came the code 70 rail, and I spent some serious time laying out the new west switch. What I decided was that the lead, the distance between the points and the frog, was too short. This apparently created a sharp "bend" in the path a train taking the diverging route. Moving the frog an inch further away from the points and relaying the approach of the siding to the frog resulted in a much smoother movement through the diverging route - the cars of the Perishable are now happy - though the crew of the Perishable may not be if the dispatcher routes them into the siding!

The first of the two switches into the Beroldingen Lumber mill complex ties the tail of the plywood spur into the SCN main. Not really what I had originally (Continued from page 16)

planned, but better than continuing to try to work parts of the mill from the inaccessible wye at the other end of the complex! Ron and Ernie did a fine job building both of these switches using continuous wing / closure / point rails. Not the way I would do it, but then I gave them the job to do and it will work just fine! One thing I did do myself was join up the code 55 from the spur to the code 83 of the diverging route. I used code 83 rail joiners with one side of one end flattened – pretty standard stuff. But it is really startling to see the difference in rail heights when they are actually married together.

The second switch Ron and Ernie built leads to a new area for the Beroldingen mill – a loads / empties track for log cars! This trackage is located next to the west end of the siding, essentially at the base of the small peninsula. Those of you who have visited the SCN over the years will recall that after the 2000 National in San Jose we rebuilt a good chunk of the upper level when we moved the main peninsula out eleven inches. The original upper level three track stub staging was hidden under the summit siding at Sergeants and

ended at the base of the small peninsula. The 2000 rebuild swung the main around the opposite direction from what it had been and across the garage doors to the opposite side of the garage and a new station and open staging. I left two of the original hidden staging tracks in place at the time. Their elevation is the same as Doughertys. We tore out the scenery at the west end of Doughertys at the base of the peninsula and connected the former stub ended staging tracks into the new switch coming off the main. Loaded log trains will move from the Fall Creek & Alba RR at Fall Creek Jct. to Doughertys, swap loads for empties, and return to Fall Creek Jct. Linton von Beroldingen is already preparing a couple of former SP Baldwins for FC&A log train service and some particularly funky log cars have already showed up on the new trackage in anticipation of future log shipments!

The rest of the NCNGRR crew has been busy elsewhere on the SCN on the summer Thursday evenings they have been over. We'll take a look at what Bill, Clark, Otis and Paul have been up to next time!

ing, PCR2007 will be the time.

Two Clinics

Kim and Ken also proposed presenting two clinics to me that day. (These two clinics may be held at the MSVRR, because transport, setup & operating their 2.5" scale models would then also be available during the MSVRR's open house.)

Kim's clinic will be Building a Live Steam Locomotive. Ken Burns' clinic will be Scratchbuilding Rolling Stock (2.5" scale). If they hold their clinics back to back together, then Kim can fire up#41 as a demo for his clinic and Ken can run and supervise #41 while Kim teaches his clinic.

Most of the techniques they've demonstrated to me that they used, including custom milling car sidings, and making their own stirrups and grabirons, and modifying commercially available details like couplers, do apply to scratchbuilding in other scales, down to Nn3. Scratchbuilding is scale independent; I know because I scratchbuild in 2.5", HOn3/30 and

Nn3.

Volunteer!
