

Final attendance was 240 registered attendees together with 20 non-rail visitors. There were four prototype tours with the tour of the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory Tour very popular. Attendees had 50 layouts to visit and nearly 65 Convention attendees participated in the 11 operating sessions which were available during the Convention.

The Convention calendar was packed with clinics on a wide variety of subjects. Presenters included past RMC editors Tony Koester and Bill Schaumburg. Clinics ran from 9:00 in the morning until 9:30 in the evening. I

was able to attend several clinics and they were all interesting and I learned a lot.

The model contest has a number of very well done models. I was completely awe-struck by

President's Report

Welcome to my very first column as PCR President. As such, I feel a need to communicate to you all how this new responsibility is affecting me and what my intentions and aspirations are for filling this important role.

First of all, I would like to express my appreciation to all those who encouraged me to accept a nomination for this job and for all those who voted for me. It is a tremendous honor and I intend to do my best to do a decent job for you. I also want to thank our past President, Pat LaTorres, and all the Board members, Department Managers, and appointed officials I have had the pleasure to work with during my four years as Vice President. You have all been

effective at introducing me to how our organization works and providing ongoing inspiration and support. And I have to say I was humbled when I scanned the last quarterly roster report and found

there are 1005 members in our region, including five organization/club memberships. That's a thousand model railroaders to serve!

One of my initial impressions of the job is that people seem very relieved that someone (else) is doing it. There also are a lot of little angles and issues that keep

coming out of the woodwork. None of them are overwhelming, but they just keep on coming. Who knows what kind of surprises are lurking around the corner for me! Fortunately, I have a number of people to call upon for advice and information, people who know a lot more about the inner workings of PCR and NMRA than I ever will. Fortunately, most members don't have to worry or be aware of some of these issues. That's what we're here to take care of for you.

Which brings us to the subject of what this job is really about, or at least what I think it's all about. Some of these points I have already made in my past role of Vice-President.

This all comes back to the reasons we join the NMRA. We love the hobby and we enjoy the company of other modelers who share this passion. We like to share ideas and learn from others who have gained expertise in areas of modeling we would like to be better at. We want to share what we have done with fellow modelers and get feedback to be able to do better. Some of us have a competitive spirit and want to enter our creations in contests, with the blue ribbon representing the ultimate compliment and respect from our peers. A large and growing number of us have participated in operating model railroads in a prototypical fashion,

something that by definition requires assembling a group of model railroaders together in the same room at the same time. Most of us enjoy visiting other modelers' layouts, just to look and be inspired.

If it seems like I'm hitting on one theme, you're right. This is basically a social organization, whose job it is to facilitate the social networking and group activities of model railroaders. Yes, there are other functions, important ones that the NMRA performs, for example setting standard and recommended practices. Can you imagine building a layout without your trusty NMRA standards gauge? Or install a DCC system without standardization of how everything is supposed to work, regardless of manufacturer? But we're talking here about what happens on the local level, the Region and Divisional level. Those other things are best handled in a centralized fashion, as they always have been.

As we all know, not everyone who enjoys model trains is interested in any of these things. It may be that being a member is not worth it for those folks. Some modelers belong to a club but don't see the need for anything more. That's okay too, although PCR provides things that no club can provide. I'm specifically thinking of diversity, not in the modern political/social sense, but in terms of

meeting and mingling with modelers from outside your immediate neighborhood, town, or club.

NMRA, of course, has its detractors, like any organization does. Some modelers, or so I've heard third hand, see the NMRA and its components as a clique of some kind, where only those who toe the line (in other words, are interested in the "correct" kinds of railroad modeling) are welcome. I don't know how widespread this attitude is, or even if there is a longer list of sins we have committed over the years. One of these years, if I get around to it, I would like to do a well-designed survey of non-NMRA modelers to get more of a handle on this. But for now I suggest that we focus on getting as good at what we do as we can, and that we continue our evolving outreach efforts.

Given all this, I'm going to go out on a limb and state that the most important thing that PCR does is to hold our annual Convention and to encourage and support our Divisions to press on with their own schedule of with their own meets and events. Thus we can provide the platform for all those things I mentioned above plus as many more as we can come up with to take place.

> And now we come to the problem section of the column. Just as the social nature of PCR points us to our priorities, it also provides us with our greatest challenge today. We PCRers are by and large an old group, mostly

advanced middle age (I love that adjective!) and elderly. That makes our peers less than ideal candidates to ensure the survival of PCR/NMRA over time. So when we have events, they are mostly social occasions for our age group. When we are encouraged to bring people in as guests to events, with the hope of recruiting them as members, they are likely to be in our age group. Modelers who are younger (but still mature adults – we're not talking about teenagers or young adults as that is another topic) may not be real excited about spending a lot of time with their parents.

Yes, there are exceptions, but the data clearly show that our average age keeps going up with the membership numbers going down with attrition. Modelers in their 40s and 50s may be less than enthusiastic about hanging out with us as opposed to attending other non NMRA railroad events where there are more of their peers. Thus, we have engaged in extended discussions and ruminations about how to revamp what we do to appeal to younger potential members without turning off the people we already have. And these efforts must continue.

These thoughts, in a nutshell, lead to my goals as President. One, to make sure we carry on the good things we do for you members such as interesting and fun conventions and meets, and two, to continue to encourage networking with outside organizations such as

modular groups, Sig groups, and so on, where modelers who have been shying away from the NMRA are active. Fortunately, good steps in both directions were taken during President LaTorres's tenure, and I hope to keep the ball rolling.

For those of you going to the NMRA National this August in Portland, I hope to see you there. My prediction is that Doug Auburg and his committee will provide an outstanding week of model railroading for us. Portland is a beautiful place that merits a visit for any excuse we can come up with, let alone an exciting occasion such as this one. I will brazenly insert a little advertisement as well. I will be presenting the latest in a series of clinics on my HO rendition of the Northwestern Pacific, this time focusing on the agony and ecstasy of trying to adhere to a prototype. Catch it if you can!

Achievement Program - Master Builder - Motive Power

Given the continuing release of new super-detailed diesels and steam engines which flow into our hobby each year, it would not be surprising if the amount of scratchbuilding of locomotives continually decreases in direct proportion. The Master Builder – Motive Power certificate includes a requirement to scratchbuild a locomotive and that requirement may mean that this certificate is one of the

or electric locomotive, traction unit, maintenance track. That definition from speeders and streetcars to the newest diesels. Not of prototypes that were not powered (vehicles such as a powered hand cars) or prototypes which were powered.

The requirements for Master Builder - Motive Power follows the same general format as the other Master Builder certificates. To qualify for this certificate, you must build three models of railroad motive power. If desired, these models can be of different gauges and/or scales. They must meet the following criteria:

- 1.All of the models must be capable of self-propulsion.
- 2. Each of the models must score at least 87½ points in an NMRA contest or under the AP Merit Judging program.
- 3. Each of the models must be super-detailed with either commercial or scratchbuilt parts.
- 4. In addition to being superdetailed, at least one of the three models must be scratchbuilt.

Currently, one of the favorite aspects of our hobby is kit-bashing/super-detailing diesel locomotives. Such a modeling project, if it scores the minimum 87½ points, would meet the requirements for the two non-scratchbuilt models.

To qualify as scratch built, the model must contain the following scratch built items:

- 1. Steam locomotives -Frame, boiler, cab, tender frame and body, and either valve gear or main or side driving rods.
- 2. Other motive power -

Body, frame, cab, truck side frames, and pantograph or trolley poles if applicable.

3. Items such as the motor, gears, drivers or wheels, couplers, trucks, etc. are all excluded from the requirement for being scratchbuilt.

Note that the term "scratchbuilt" implies that the modeler has done all of the necessary layout and fabrication that produces the final dimensions, appearance, and operating qualities of the model. This is a good statement of the intent and spirit of the "scratchbuilt" requirement. Notice that it does not say that the use of a few commercial detail parts will disqualify the model as being "scratchbuilt". In general, the same standard applies that is used in contest judging: "Completely Scratchbuilt" means that 90% or more of the model was scratch built. (But you still need to scratchbuild the specific items listed above.) This means that in contest or merit judging, the model you are claiming as "scratchbuilt" should have earned at least 11 points in that category out of a possible 15 points.

Once you complete these requirements, submit a Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) that identifies the models and the commercial parts used, etc. The easiest way to do this is to enter the model in a Divisional. Regional, or National modeling contest and simply attach a model contest form which includes this information and also documents your score. Send





In Memoriam - Bob Dupont

In early May an important part of PCR passed with the death of Bob Dupont at age 85. Bob was a

powerful force in model railroading, both locally and throughout the nation. He owned Peninsula Hobbies for 15 years and over that counter helped several generations of shop visitors become avid model railroaders. He was instrumental in introducing the joys of O Scale modeling to many in the San Francisco Bay Area.



But Bob was far more than a friend at the hobby shop, he was universally regarded as personable, thoughtful, friendly, a supportive

personable, thoughtful, friendly, a supportive leader and a friend of great integrity. Much more than just a booster of the hobby in some of its "golden years", Bob was an accomplished modeler in both HO and O and was renowned for his exceptional Maintenance of Way models and open loads.

Bob's dedication to the hobby ran deep and he served as PCR Vice-president in 1973-1974 and as our Region President in 1975-1976. He went on to serve the NMRA as National Vice-president 1982-1986 and National President 1986-1990. In 1986 Bob was awarded the NMRA President's Award and in 1991 NMRA Honorary Life Member #30. Bob was Chairman of the 1981 NMRA National Convention held in San Mateo and the 1986 O Scale National Convention in Burlingame.

He was a key member of the team that produced O Scale West from its second year in 1992 through this year's event, taking responsibility for the outstanding lineup of layouts for attendees to visit. Visitors to Bob's Tall Pine Timber Company home layout were in for a special treat – a chance to see a great deal of our hobbies history in the many vintage models Bob had on display both on his layout and in cases mounted on many walls in his home. Visitors also got a chance to meet his gracious wife Diane and devoted German Shepherd, Harli.

Bob was recognized within the region with the PCR President's Award in 1972 and his presentation of the John Allen Award in 1982.

More than just a model railroader, Bob was an

equally consummate leader in the many aspects of his life, having proudly served as a US Marine during Korea and was a leader in his other hobby of vintage automobiles, especially Fords. We lost an integral part of our history with Bob's passing. "The lights are all green Bob, Highball!"

The Answers Are Out There - Convention Clinics

Regional conventions are a major benefit of membership in NMRA. Model railroad publications, both paper and online, can inspire and educate to a degree, but where else but at a convention can you take your own photos of members' layouts, question clinic presenters, ogle contest models, and get together with friends having similar interests who live hundreds of miles away from you?

The 2015 PCR convention, The Club Car, is now history and I am back at home, but now enriched with new tools, techniques, and ideas to try out on my modeling (not to mention some hobby shop and swap meet purchases). What follows are just a few of the many things I took away from the clinics I attended. PCR has an especially strong clinic program featuring worldclass presenters and I

benefitted from every one I took in.

Tony Thompson presented well-researched information on tank car operations and on "signature" freight cars, those cars which constituted a major portion of a given railroad's fleet and which were distinctive in design. You can access Tony's notes for the operations clinic at

http://modelingthesp.blogspot.com/; look for the waybill series (and check out the many other topics of interest as well). Model Railroad Hobbyist magazine featured Tony's articles on the signature freight cars in the April 2013 and March 2015 issues; find them at http://www.mrhmag.com. To make your model railroad's waybills look like they were filled out in the 1950s, Tony suggests you try one of the following fonts available for your computer: Mom's Typewriter, Bell Gothic, or American Typewriter.

Bob Chaparro described a very complete tuneup procedure for your freight cars. He pointed us to an online demonstration created by the La Mesa Model Railroad Club. A 10-minute clip can be found at www.youtube.com/watch?v=brSGhEbQBmM, which will then direct you to a longer 60-minute version if you so desire; they are well worth seeing. Two techniques I had not previously considered were (1) putting the car on a surface plate to see whether all of its flanges touch and (2) building a test fixture to tilt the car 35° from vertical to see whether it rights itself.

Dave Connery elegantly demonstrated stepby-step structure modeling in styrene and wood. He touted a useful scriber for styrene which can be purchased from Micro-Mark (item #82131, called a Plasticutter) and a stain for weathering both styrene

and wood, which you can make by adding a couple of teaspoons of india ink and a few more of brown leather dye to a pint of isopropyl rubbing alcohol. Dave also recommends Formula 560 Canopy Glue for attaching window glazing and for gluing together dissimilar materials.

Dave Biondi inspired me to try my hand at landscape painting in acrylics. As we watched, he created from scratch a

he created from scratch a beautiful backdrop section and in the process made it look so easy that I came away convinced that—with some practice—I could do the same myself. Of course, to get the full effect, you had to be there, but Dave recommended some books which are readily available and which should get you inspired and started on your own painting: Landscape Painting: Essential Concepts and Techniques for Plein Air and Studio Practice, by Mitchell Albala (Dave says this is the best for beginners) and Painting Better Landscapes, by Margaret Kessler (Dave says this is

his all-around favorite).

I could go on, but you get the idea—many good clinics. I took the photo at the head of this column on Jim Dias' highly realistic Western Pacific Railroad, built in HO scale to depict the Feather River

area in the spring of 1938. If you missed The Club Car, you can see that you missed a lot. Be sure to sign up early for the 2016 PCR convention, which will arrive in Modesto next April. I hope to see you then,

if not before!

up front and Seth is sitting, I think we're discussing layout design issues. If Seth is standing and I'm heckling him, its operations. Good folks, interesting issues and discussions, some of which carried on both later in the evening and even after the convention!

The Maker Train room on Friday was fascinating; this should come as no surprise given the tech hotbed we live in here in the Bay Area. Looking Back The History of the John Allen Award

In 1973 the John Allen award was developed by Bob Dupont and others to recognize special contributions to our hobby while simultaneously commemorating PCR's well-known modeler, John Allen, "The Wizard of Monterey". The first recipients of the award were the Gorre & Daphetid Operators and they became the initial selection committee. Here is the current "charter" for the award.

The John Allen Award is presented annually to the individual(s) who the selection committee feels:

Best exemplifies John Allen's support for the model railroad hobby through personal involvement and willingness to assist others in their pursuit of the hobby. This support may include, but is not limited to, work in model railroad organizations; leadership of activities for model railroaders; authorship of or in model and prototype railroading publications; presentation of model railroad clinics and classes and sharing of techniques.

The award is jointly sponsored by The Pacific Coast Region/National Model Railroad Association and the Coast Division PCR/NMRA, and managed by the PCR Honors Committee. The award is made to any person deemed to be deserving by the selection committee, without regard to membership in any organization.

The selection committee consists of all living recipients of the John Allen Award. Past awardees are:

Positive Train Control implementation date may be extended

U.S. Senator Roy Blunt (R-Mo.) introduced a bill on March 4 to extend the deadline for positive train control (PTC) rollout in the U.S. to at least December 2020. The current law requires all railroads that carry passengers or that haul hazardous-by-inhalation material on main lines to install a PTC system by Dec. 31, 2015. Senators referred bill S.650, the Railroad Safety and Positive Train Control Extension Act, to the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation. Sens. Claire McCaskill (D-Mo.), John Thune (R-S.D.), and Bill Nelson (D-Fla.) joined Blunt as co-sponsors for the bill.

NMRA InfoNet News (Infoblast) for June, 2015

What is the RAC director? Recently I was asked to write the article to tell the readers about the position I hold on NMRA Board of Directors. I am the RAC Director or Regional Advisory Council Director. I am the Board Member who represents the Region Presidents and or their delegate.

The purpose of the RAC is to:

Convey Region opinion to the Board of Directors and other officers within the NMRA national level.

Comment on any dues increases beyond index which comments shall be considered by the Board of Directors prior to the adoption of said dues increases.

Receive the agenda, motions, and reports electronically at the same time as the Board of Directors receives them; and may, but need not, as a body comment on said materials through and by their representative on the Board.

The RAC, acting as a nominating committee, shall nominate, with the goal of at least two candidates for its position, and elect by a majority vote, the RAC position to the Board of Directors.

The RAC may also propose Regulations changes and by two-thirds vote place matters by way of initiative or referendum on the next available NMRA ballot in accordance with provisions set forth in Article XII of the NMRA Executive Handbook.

The Board of Directors of the NMRA shall establish, with the assistance and concurrence of the Regions, a Regional Advisory Council (RAC). This position was created some time ago and I am third Director to act in this capacity since its inception.

It shall not serve as a level of governance of the NMRA, but shall provide input to the Board of Directors representing the different perspectives of the Regions.

The body shall consist of one representative from each Region, who normally would be the Region President or such other representative that the Region designates for said purpose, as well as an alternate in case the Region representative is unable to participate.

There shall be a position on the Board of Directors for a representative of the Regional Advisory Council (RAC) as established under the provisions of Article VIII, Paragraph 10 of the Regulations.

Representatives on the Regional Advisory Council should have electronic communications access available and shall meet on a periodic basis, in a manner and under circumstances to be developed by the RAC.

In accordance with Article VIII, Section 10, Paragraph E, the Regional Advisory Council shall select candidates for a representative to serve on the Board of Directors and said representative shall not be subject to membership vote. Each Region shall have one vote exercised through the Regional Advisory Council, and the Council, acting as a nominating committee, shall, as a goal, try to nominate two candidates for secret balloting by the RAC representatives.

This in the nutshell is what the RAC is, how they are elected and what they do as part of the National Organization known as the National Model Railroad Association.

In Memorium

MILWAUKEE, Wis. – Walter J. Mundschau, who led Kalmbach Publishing Co. as its president from 1987 to 2000 and also served as TRAINS' publisher for several years, died May 31 at age 80.

A native of Sharon, Wis., "Walt," as his colleagues knew him, was hired by Kalmbach as controller in 1968. He was promoted to executive vice president in 1984 and named president in 1987. After his retirement in 2000, he served for several years as chairman of Kalmbach's board of directors.

Mundschau presided over Kalmbach during an era of significant growth, as the company moved beyond its original fields of railroading and model railroading and into new special-interest markets such as astronomy, bird-watching, and jewelry-making.

But Mundschau also kept close ties to the original magazines, TRAINS and MODEL RAILROADER. He became publisher of TRAINS in August 1987, upon the retirement of longtime Editor David P. Morgan, and served in that capacity until the February 1991 issue, when he was succeeded by Russ Larson.
