

President's Report

President's Report

For this issue I am returning yet again to the topic of aging model railroaders.

While I was watching the Academy Award show I was surprised that a film I had seen in the theater months ago that wasn't supposed to make it won Best Picture. Titled "Spotlight," it was about a true story of investigative journalism that led to important social changes.



President Getz noted that the average age of NMRA members has greatly increased since the 1970s from 39 to today's 67. In contrast to the efforts of those dedicated reporters an article recently appeared in the Wall Street Journal, of all places, that dealt with the death spiral of the model railroading hobby. The essence of it

was that the hobby's enthusiastic participants keep getting older and younger people are failing to show any interest in keeping it going. This was a real doom and gloom piece, and because of the prestige of the source I suppose we're supposed to be impressed. Ha!

The first tip that something wasn't quite right, that the author may not have been up on his topic very well, was the repeated use of the term "train set" in the first stages of the article in reference to one modeler's huge and fully sceniced scale model basement railroad. We are informed at one point that this man actually added to his house so that his "train set" could be bigger. There is an embedded video of his railroad in the on-line version as well

(http://www.wsj.com/articles/ end-of-the-line-for-modeltrains-aging-hobbyiststrundle-on-1455157546). Unfortunately, the videographer was unaware that he was using close-ups to document things like misaligned windows in structures and cobwebs.

A simple Google lookup of the author, James R. Hagerty, revealed that he has had a long and distinguished journalism career and has written several books. However, his specialty is manufacturing and one of his books is about Fannie Mae. So how did he become versed enough about the status and future of model railroading? One would assume he spent some time doing research on the subject, right?

But as far as I can tell from reading this thing, the only manufacturer he spent any time inquiring about was Lionel. To make matters worse, the phrase "serious hobbyists" was used only in the context of this venerable firm (no offense to hi rail fans intended). One would think, with his knowledge and experience, he could have explored the recent volume of sales of model railroad products and perhaps some demographics on who is buying them, and then made some interpretations or

predictions based on the information he obtained. But he didn't, not even for Lionel. Instead, he relied on anecdotes and suppositions he obtained from having conversations with people he contacted.

Well, there was one exception. He apparently contacted or read statements by our NMRA President. Apparently President Getz noted that the average age of NMRA members has greatly increased since the 1970s from 39 to today's 67.

By the way, this brings up another issue that I have touched on before. Not all modelers are NMRA members. Those kinds of figures definitely raise the question of whether the NMRA will survive, but says nothing directly about the hobby as a whole.

We would like as many modelers as possible to consider joining the NMRA, but some just aren't interested. This makes it harder to get a handle on how big the pool of younger modelers is. We could suppose that many younger

Be sure to register for "Taking It To The Streets," the 2016 PCR Convention in Modesto, April 20-24. modelers are turned off by how old most of us are and by their perception that their particular interests are not emphasized and appreciated by the bulk of NMRA members. Some of our institutions may not be to their liking (e.g., some modelers like to bring their models to meetings of organizations such as historical societies, Prototype Modelers, etc., but don't like the formalized contest venues of the NMRA). Or, as we hear over and over, young people just aren't interested in joining things. Of course, all of this is conjecture.

I have a lot of questions for which we don't have good answers. For instance, what happens in future years to all those youngsters who earn Boy Scout merit badges for railroading at our events? When we consider all the narrow gauge, garden railroad, prototype modeling, modular, various clubs, and other groups outside of the NMRA fold, how many people are participating who are not NMRA members? What is the age distribution of these folks?

In the on-line comments to the Journal article, one person blamed the decline in interest in model railroading to the housing problem! Model railroads require space and nowadays less people have it available, he wrote. If that were true, how have the British managed to keep their modeling vibrant and active? By becoming good at designing interesting layouts for super small spaces, inventing "fiddle yards" in the process. Another commentator suggested that young students give up on their model railroad interest because their peers think it is odd, geeky, and uncool. Okay, folks, dig back into your memory – is that anything new?

So is Mr. Haggerty correct in his assertion that the model railroading is headed for oblivion? Maybe, maybe not. Remember how slot cars were going to replace model trains?

P.S. Be sure to register for "Taking It To The Streets," the 2016 PCR Convention in Modesto, April 20-24. There are some great clinics and tours planned, and the hotel venue is terrific. As an added twist, we are holding it with a new partner, the Feather River Rail Society. Looking forward to seeing you all there.

ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAM

Model Railroad Engineer - Electrical (Continued) by Jack Burgess, MMR, Manager, PCR Achievement Department

In the last issue of the *Branch Line,* we began a discussion of the requirements for Model Railroad Engineer -Electrical. Like other certificates, the full requirements for this category are available online at the NMRA website.

The essence of this AP certificate is to demonstrate your knowledge of wiring a model railroad. The required work can be done on your own layout, a club layout, or even on a



The essence of this AP certificate is to demonstrate your knowledge of wiring a model railroad. friend's layout. As indicated in the last issue, the first two requirements for this AP certificate concern 1) constructing and demonstrating the basic wiring of a layout; and 2) wiring and demonstrating the electrical operation of three items such as

turnout controls, slip switches, crossing, etc.

The third requirement may seem more challenging but has a number of options. Basically, you need to wire and demonstrate the electrical operation of at least three items from a list of 23 possible choices, most of which can be satisfied with the installation of commercial units. Keep in mind that many of the first items for related to traditional block control while DCC control items are further along on the list. These items include:

1. Electrical turnout

position indication on a control panel or at trackside for a minimum of four turnouts. (Remember that many commercial switch machines have electrical terminals to allow you to do this easily.)

2. Track occupancy indication on a control panel or at trackside for a minimum of five blocks.

3. Cab control, making provision for the connection of at least two power supplies to a minimum of five blocks as the trains progress. (This means that your layout has at least five blocks, each of which can be controlled by one of two power supplies. The five blocks do not have to be in a row along the same stretch of track.)

4. Engine terminal, including an electrically powered turntable or transfer table, a minimum of three stall tracks, and at least two blocked storage sections for parking locomotives outside the stall area. (This means you need to have a total of five tracks (three inside an engine house or roundhouse, and two outside), that you can cut power independently to store motive power).

5. Two turnout junctions with electrical interlocking and protecting trackside signals. (This is simply a turnout with electrical protection to prevent a train from going through a turnout that is set against it. Again, the electrical terminals on a switch machine, combined with a couple of insulated rail joiners, make this a fairly easy project.

6. High Frequency Lighting (This is an old term for Constant Lighting.)

7. Electronic throttle with inertia and braking provisions.

8. Grade crossing with electrically actuated warning indication. (You don't have to design or build the circuitry for this yourself. There are a number of commercial components available that you can just wire up to meet this requirement. Or you can use commercial plans that appear in magazines from time to time. Or you can do it from scratch.)

9. Two-way block signaling with automatic train detection for at least five blocks.

10. Operating overhead wire, using either pantographs, trolley poles, or both for current collection.

11. Installation of an advanced electronic and/or computer control for the model railroad.

12. Design, installation, and operation of animated mechanical and/or electrical displays. (This doesn't have to be a huge animated display - think about small eye-catching displays like animated industries or signs.)

13. Design, installation, and operation of mechanical and/or electrical

layout lighting displays. (This means lights which illuminate the layout, as opposed to lighted things on the layout. For example, lighting which simulates the change from day to dusk to night)

14. Installation of a command control receiver. Modifications or additions to the device's wiring are required. Installing a plugequipped decoder into a manufactured prewired socket is not sufficient.

15. Installation of a command control throttle buss line around a layout capable of handling at least two throttles at three or more separate locations.

Commercially assembled complete units are not acceptable in the items below:

16. Construction and installation of a sound system. (This does not have to be an on-board sound system, it could be an underthe-layout system.)

17. Construction and installation of a signaling system.

18. Development and installation of a CTC system.

19. Installation and operation of an on-board video system.

20. Computer generated block detection information.

21. Hardwired or stored control program (i.e. computer) for operation of the railroad.

22. Development and demonstration of a computer-to-railroad interface.

23. Other: Examples of 'other' include flashing

warning lights on locomotives, or end-of-train devices on cabooses, etc.

These are just some of the more common electrical projects which are typical on many layouts. It is therefore easy to see that many layouts already satisfy this particular requirement. For example, most of the layouts with DCC would automatically satisfy two of the requirements in this category (Items 14 and 15).

The fourth and fifth requirements basically involve documentation proving that you understand what you have done to satisfy the other requirements. First, you must prepare a schematic drawing of the propulsion circuitry for the layout showing the gaps, blocks, feeders, etc. This drawing does not need to show turnout control wiring, building lights, etc. It is therefore much like the drawings included in Model Railroader magazine layout project articles which illustrate for the new modeler where gaps are required, where to connect the track power, etc. Finally, you need to also prepare a schematic drawing identifying the wiring and components used to complete the category on wiring a turnout, crossing, etc. mentioned in the last issue and the three items selected from the above bullets.

Once you have satisfied all of the requirements, submit a Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) which includes the required schematic drawings and describes the features that you used to satisfy the requirements. You are not judged for a Merit Award for this certificate. However, the operation of the various features must be witnessed by the AP Chairman or his/her designee. The witnesses must sign the SOQ. Send the completed SOQ to your Divisional AP representative, along with a photocopy of your NMRA membership card and you are on your way toward another certificate!




Daylight Meet Set for May 21

The Napa Valley club hosted our February meeting. They offered the RED members the opportunity to run their club equipment, or to bring something of their own that conformed to NMRA standards. The subsequent sights included Steve Lewis' spiffy little steam Newfie Flyer, and my own GN Northern in Glacier



paint pulling the club's rendition of the Wine Train. That was a lot of color, not necessarily compatible, running down the rails, but the hybrid locomotive is equipped with a smoke system synchronized with the exhaust beat and it looked really impressive.

The Show and Tell portion of our formal meeting had but three presenters, but each was most interesting in its own way. Ed Merrin took us through the process of recreating on his HO layout the wharf area of Petaluma in 1958. The Petaluma and Santa Rosa Railroad had trackage along this wharf, trackage which is still there today (and being considered for restoration as the foundation for a trolley operation between downtown Petaluma and the Outlet Mall northwest of town). Ed's presentation was almost a clinic, taking us through the search for historical photographs, noting the differences in the buildings with the passage of time and explaining the methods used to model the buildings themselves. Dave Turner took us through the process of reworking and repainting an HO model of a Southern Pacific TW-12, a locomotive with which he had a connection in his early years. Then former Director and current Tall Guy Dave Croshere took us through his experiences building models

that led him to construct a modeling stand that would bring his work on his bench up to eve level, and which afforded features (such as a clamping area) that the plain old box that he and so many of us have been using does not. It is a clever design, and looks as good as Dave's prize winning models do.

The main program was presented by club member Steve Passmore. Steve took us through the history of the control systems used by the club. He

recalled the early DC days, in which large, noisy relays and other equipment made surplus by the Telephone Company played a large role. He noted how parts for this equipment were no longer available. He then chronicled the club's decision to add DCC control, while retaining the option of using DC. He noted that the club had chosen Digitrax over NCE, and there was an inference that this may not have been the best choice. The layout could be run on DC, or DCC, but not both at the same time. He then talked about the perceived need to rewire the Nelson yard, and how retaining the DC option would make this process very

difficult. He said that the issue was put to a vote, and that the outcome of the vote was the exclusion of the DC option on a permanent basis. The club is now DCC only. A walk around the layout revealed some impressive new scenery and structures.

The 2018 PCR Convention will be hosted by the RED. Under the guiding hand of Director Dave (Croshere) we have been making plans over the last few months. Most of the lead personnel positions have been filled, by very willing people, and negotiations for a venue are in their final stages. We think we are going to give you a good show!



Gene Mayer, Past PCR President Passes

Model railroading has lost a strong supporter and active participant with the passing of Louis E. "Gene" Mayer on March 6, 2016. Gene died peacefully from

complications from his long battle with Diabetes. He was 80. Gene was a lifelong model railroader and a member of the NMRA and PCR for nearly 60 years. During those many years in this organization Gene touched the lives of thousands of others in the hobby while serving in nearly every



Gene was Chairman of the 1986 PCR Convention held in Grass Valley and the very successful 1991 PCR Convention held in Sacramento. In addition, he served on at least six other PCR Convention Committees.

Gene was the Branch Line reporter for Sierra Division for ten years and served on a number of Sierra Division and PCR committees. Gene was also a long-time and dedicated supporter of International Railfair and an active member of the Sacramento

> Modular Railroaders. He also had an HO home layout, the Freeborn & Western. Gene was often listed among the winners in the Freight Car category at PCR Contests and was known for his freight car loads, especially hopper loads, a topic he gave clinics on at Division, Region and National events.

The Answers Are Out There: What the Future Holds, Part 2

Model railroading's future "is like a box of chocolates—you never know what you're going to get." Yet, despite our dismal record at prognostication, humans are obsessed with what might happen next year or next decade, and it's only prudent to prepare for the worst while hoping for the best. In my last column I laid out some pretty sobering statistics showing that model railroading's popularity in the U.S. is declining markedly, both as a percent of population and in actual numbers. The average ages of readers of Model Railroader and members of NMRA increase each day, while the proportion of teenagers in the hobby (20% in the 1960s, 6% by 1984) approaches zero. It's true that today the quality and variety of products available to the scale model railroader is greater than ever before; but it's also true that if the number of hobbyists shrinks below some threshold level, that will rapidly change, and not for the better.

However, the situation is much more complex than a simple line with a negative slope, pointing toward oblivion. The dreary stats from the United States may not be replicated other places; model railroading appears to be thriving in Europe, Asia, Australia, and New Zealand. At the recent NMRA convention in Portland I noticed many modelers from Australia and New Zealand (by one account 32 attendees flew in from those two nations) and our NMRA president, Charlie Getz, who recently returned from a trip to China, reported that some 250,000 Chinese citizens are active model railroaders. I regularly pick up a couple of monthly model railroad publications from the U.K. and I'm always impressed with the high quality of the modeling work and the apparent vibrancy of the hobby in that tiny island nation.

One thing I've noticed about the U.K. hobby magazines is a major emphasis on passenger trains. I can't help speculating that there would be significantly greater enthusiasm about model trains in the United States if passenger rail travel here more closely resembled what is found in Europe and Asia. As it is, few Americans ever encounter trains, aside from the occasional annoying delay at a grade crossing. Perhaps building up high speed rail service in the U.S. will lead to model railroad dividends in the long term.

Beyond supporting HSR, I recommend promoting our wonderful hobby more directly. No one is more capable and qualified to do that promotion than we model railroaders are. I submit that our first steps are to decide who our target audience will be and then to choose effective ways to reach out to them. Here are some of my thoughts about potential audiences:

Children are the most commonly suggested subjects, perhaps with the idea that after they grow up, good memories will draw them into the hobby. Youngsters certainly gravitate to miniature models and are more willing than their elders to try unfamiliar things. Two problems with this idea are (1) young children can't get involved without parental support and (2) it's not clear that early experience with Thomas the Tank Engine or Brio trains will lead to a mature interest in scale model railroading.

Young married couples can perhaps be persuaded to take up a hobby which they can share with each other and with a growing family. An obstacle we've seen, especially in today's economy, is that many young adults have neither time nor financial resources for such endeavors.

Retirees have not often been suggested as a group to target. After all, bringing in more 70-year-olds will not lower the average age of NMRA members. But think about it: many retirees cast about desperately for something enjoyable to do with themselves after they've stopped working for a living. And who more than retirees have the time and disposable income to devote to a hobby? Moreover, they are likely to share their new-found interest with their children (the young married couples) and grandchildren.

Women have made remarkable strides in our hobby. We have female master model

railroaders and the current editor of NMRA Magazine is a woman, Cynthia Priest. In the mid-1970s, my wife, Sylvia, was one of the few female members of PCR's Daylight Division. For at least the last decade, however, we have seen a marked increase the number of women who participate in NMRA's divisional and regional activities.

From all of these considerations I conclude that we need to try to appeal to all ages and sexes, but with a special emphasis on retired folks and women. Next, we need to think about how to frame this appeal. I do **not** propose that we take on time-consuming advertising and education chores in addition to whatever hours we spend building and running trains. Instead, I suggest that we make what we already do more visible to a wider audience. Several years ago, Gary Saxton, a Daylight Division member, organized an annual public open house for home layouts in the Fresno area. This has been a popular and successful recurring event. George Pisching put together a one-day model railroad display at a local branch of the Fresno County Library. Several modelers in the area participated and we sparked much interest in trains. We've all

built models of locomotives, rolling stock, and structures: how about displaying them someplace and explaining or demonstrating how you designed, built, finished, and/or weathered them? The basic idea is to get out there and show what you do in the hobby, perhaps alongside some other hobbyists from your club or division. Of course, you need to have a venue in which to display your work. Where might that be? How about train shows, county fairs, libraries, churches, craft fairs, malls, and schools; basically, anywhere people gather. Maybe you could invite some acquaintances who are not in the hobby to observe your next operating session. Perhaps you could create a website, a blog, or a video clip to post on YouTube. Let your imagination guide you into the future.

The bottom line is that I don't know what the future holds: will the model railroad chocolate of 2035 have a strawberry cream or a garlic jalapeno center? Who can say? All I know is that I plan to plant a bunch of strawberries. Who is with me?

The Answers Are Out There:

Placing Industries on a Shelf Layout by Robert Pethoud, Chairman, Member Aid, Daylight Division

Most industries served by model railroads are more believable when they dwarf the freight cars which are spotted at them for loading and unloading. Face it: a model of a box factory or woolen mill accommodating a single boxcar is just not convincing. On the other hand, we model railroaders almost never have enough space to put in an industry built to scale size. This was the quandary I faced as I designed Fall Creek Branch, intended to be a portable, stand-alone, switching layout. I needed (well, wanted very badly) to fit nine busy and realistic-looking industries, along with all the track serving them, into a space 15 inches wide and 8 feet long. Did I mention it was to be HO scale?

The solution I came up with was to situate the main line 10 inches back from the front fascia. This allowed me to put complete buildings in front of the main and still have room at the back for minimum-depth structures against the 18-inch tall, painted hardboard backdrop. Two spurs in front of the main track

serve five industries which were carefully chosen to be generally low and/or see-through. Only a two-story hardware store blocks the operator's view of the track behind. Moreover, except for the hardware store, these rail customers are basically transfer points where trucks bring merchandise to be shipped or where they haul merchandise away and thus can legitimately be both busy and small in size.

Two more spurs behind the main line serve four industries with much larger footprints: a furniture factory, a grain elevator complex, a cannery, and a sash and door mill. They are modeled by seven mostly tall buildings, each only a few inches deep. Each of these four rail customers takes between three and five car lengths of spur track and, by standing several stories high, appears massive enough to require frequent rail service.

The photo of Fall Creek Co-Op shows this complex of three low-relief structures as seen through and over the Klamath Fruit loading shed. The Co-Op consists of the front halves of Walthers #3036 Farmers Cooperative Grain Elevator (and storage building) and Campbell #449 Grain Storage Bin. Klamath Fruit is a mashup of Northeastern #40020 Transfer Station and BTS #27800 Covered Wood Rick.

The photo of the west end of Fall Creek shows the sash and door mill—the large red building with three gabled dormer windows and adjoining boiler house at the far left, both built from scratch—against the backdrop. In front of these imposing (half-) structures is the busy team track area, featuring an end-loading ramp, transfer platform, and bridge crane (from Walthers



#4048 Piggyback Ramps). None of these latter features hide or restrict access to the tracks and buildings behind.

Not shown in the photos is the east end of Fall Creek, where a spur at the front serves an oil distributor and a cattle pen with loading ramp. Neither of these industries interferes with an operator's view of or access to the three-story tall American Furniture Factory (Blair Line #192 Warehouse Backdrop Building) situated behind them against the backdrop.

Most of us model railroaders need huge industries to ship and receive the loads in those scores of freight cars we pick up and set out every time we run trains. I implore you not to make do with a tiny brewery or minuscule refinery when you can build an enormous one easily, inexpensively, and relatively quickly. Don't settle for a paper mill or automotive assembly plant the size of a large boxcar when you can instead build one the size of a small city. You just have to remember to situate the bulk of it on the far side of your backdrop!

Inside the Iron Horse Contest Room Call for judges (veterans and newbies alike)

Part of our "**Modesto, Taking it to the Streets**" **Convention Contest** involves actually judging models, whether they'd be rolling stock, structures, dioramas, modules, photos and arts & crafts. To accomplish this we need a certain number of judges so no one is overworked and the process of judging can be accomplished smoothly and timely.



I am extending an invitation to anyone interested in helping with judging. I am extending an invitation to anyone interested in helping with judging. Some of you have judged before and we welcome you back. Some of you have thought about judging but circumstances have not allowed you to, while for some, the anxiety of not meeting believed, yet unrealistic expectations could have aborted your plans. Some of you might not have given it a thought until now, not until you were faced with my plea on this very column.

Look, let me explain judging in simple terms: groups of three people are assigned to judge one category only through the entire contest; each judge follows a very simple script, called a matrix, arrives at a conclusion as to the points to be awarded the model based on that same matrix, compares the number with the other two judges and the three of them arrive at a final score. How scary is that?

To make it fair to the contestants, judges will be given a short introduction to the do's and don'ts of judging so that everyone judging will have a basic training. I will let judges know well in advance the date/time/place; historically it will be held informally in a meeting room at the Convention the evening before Contest judging.

Now, to the positives about judging: If you have entered models or intend to enter models, this is a great way to find out how you can become a better modeler by learning what the judges require in order to score higher on the matrix. It makes sense, no? As a judge you will soon learn that if this detail had been added, if that change had been done on the model or if that explanation was given in the paperwork you would have been able to score the model with higher points. Knowing that, does it not follow that when you work on a model yourself or do the contest write up for your model, you will indeed make sure those areas are covered? Point made!

You will earn volunteer points toward AP (Achievement Program) and eventually MMR (Master Model Railroader) by earning Merit Awards in Contest thanks to the lessons you learned as a judge.

You will be offered a free lunch as a thank you. I am told these lunches are very nice affairs!

You will be given a ribbon to wear on your Convention name badge that will distinguish you as a model contest judge and volunteer.

You will forge new friendships by working closely with other judges and I will guarantee this: you will want to be part of judging again and again.

The negatives about judging:

As much as I bash my brain, I cannot come up with any! Geez! Dahh!


