


swap meet and lots of

### **President's Report**

Let's get back to membership, age, and thefuture of NMRA.

We have generally accepted the fact that we have an aging membership and we struggle to recruit younger members into our organization. There have been a number of proposed factors responsible for this situation, which, if it persists for too long, threatens our ability to function as we do now. These include the ideas

that (a) fewer of the "younger" (which has various definitions) people are interested in trains now because trains are less likely to be parts of their lives, (b) even if they are interested in trains they are not prone to join

organizations, and (c) they are more inward and preoccupied with video games and online activities than they are in building things. Another explanation – that potential modelers wait until the kids are out of the house and they retire – has floated around, although our ranks are stuffed with longterm members who did not follow that pattern. Finally, some of us have described our growing realization that our group, the PCR, is a nation of old grandpas who, hard as we try, don't understand what it is these vounger folk would want to do with their railroad time anyway.

Whatever the causes are, the fact is that as we age, our membership is slowly sinking. PCR membership was 1005 at the end of March 2014, but dropped to 996 the following year and by this year was down to 978. Three members were reported deceased in 2014-2015 but twelve this year. Finally, 33 failed to renew their membership in 2014-2015 but that figure increased to 75 this year. It's not that we aren't finding new members (27 in 2015-2015, 45 in 2015-2016), but we lose more than we gain.

Fortunately, rather than grumble about the fact that younger generations aren't just like us, a number of enterprising PCR members have taken active steps to be present at a variety of events and venues where hobbyists of all stripes may be lurking. For several years former PCR President Pat LaTorres has been representing PCR/NMRA at the annual Bay Area Prototype Modelers meet in the East Bay. This event is swarming with modelers showing off their impressive creations, and many are not NMRA members and are younger than our membership average. But their event doesn't resemble a PCR meet. There's no structure other than a few clinics in a side room, just lots of sharing. Nonetheless, PCR has a table there and in fact is a sponsor of the event. Coast **Division Superintendent** 

Frank Markovich and Coast member Mike Blumensaadt have carted around their layout building display (9art of the NMRA "Build a Memory" program) to all kinds of community events where they are the sole representatives of NMRA. Various members, like Steve Wesolowski and untold others pitch camp at train shows and similar gatherings waving the PCR/NMRA banner.

A grass roots movement has been growing on the PCR Yahoo Group to establish a PCR presence at the "Maker Faires" sprouting all over Northern California, four scheduled in PCR territory between now and the end of the year. Turns out there are already a number of railroad themed things going on there, but never anything officially NMRA. In addition, the events are teeming with hobbyists and modelers working in other venues. PCR being in such an environment might be like it was in my earlier academic life, when our boss would purposely put people in neighboring offices to see if collaborations would arise. See Dave Grenier's calendar listings on our website for upcoming Maker Faires.

Now there are most likely naysayers among you, of course. They will point out that our efforts to reach out in this manner have failed to produce any surge in new membership. The folks that chat with us at these events are never heard from again,

the wide-eved youngsters who drag their parents over to our displays are merely teasers. Yes, this is technically true. We do not have the means to check in. say, ten years to see what happened. But common sense tells me that good marketing practice involves staying in the public eye instead of hiding out in our own restricted meetings and publications. Let's not let then forget, if they ever knew, that we exist.

Meanwhile, a thread appeared on the PCR Yahoo group that may have some relevance to our ability to reach out. It has to do with what kinds of miniature railroading hobby activities are serious enough to warrant NMRA approval.

The NMRA has a mission statement on its website that reads as follows:

"The National Model Railroad Association, Inc. advances the global scale model railroading community through education, advocacy, standards, and social interaction."

The key phrase is "scale model railroading." But what does that exactly mean and what does it exclude? Most people would agree that Brio trains are simple toys and have nothing to do with scale modeling. I think that the majority would consider Lego trains very creative but not scale modeling. But there is a lot of in between stuff.

Again, from the NMRA site, "The trains that we commonly refer to as

'Tinplate', 'Hi-Rail' or 'Scaleplate' run on track that doesn't scale out to the real thing for the size of the trains. Many times, the train cars and locomotives are shortened versions of scale. There is nothing wrong with building a layout around this equipment and there are a large number of layouts around the country using 3rail track and 'Tinplate' or 'Scaleplate' type of equipment. They are model railroads. They are just not 'scale' model railroads in the same way that HO and N are." Does anyone else note that O and S were left out in the last sentence?

O Scalers in general may be more tolerant than us smaller gauge folks, since the road from Lionel sets to O Scale can have an intermediate step, taking the Lionel equipment and track and building a ¼ inch scale diorama for it to operate in. In my own case, when I was twelve or so I got ahold of a paperback called "Model Railroading" published by

Lionel. This book had a 5<sup>th</sup> edition in 1990, which I purchased out of nostalgia. It reviews all the scales and gauges, has lots of tips on scratchbuilding structures and covered doing scenery and operations. Of course the main thrust was focused on using Lionel equipment. It was a bridge for me and eventually led to my trading my stuff in for HO.

Well, not everyone went on to HO or O Scale, or whatever, but they did as the book suggested. Does this mean that these practitioners of "Hi-Rail" (or 3 rail Scale as some call it now) model railroading don't belong in the NMRA? That NMRA will not sponsor events that feature such models? What about Garden railroads? A large proportion of the outdoor garden layouts I have scene take quite a few liberties with car length and so on.

And are HO, N, and other "scale venues" so pure? Are they accurately

reproducing the exact track gauges of the prototype, or the correct prototypical rail height? What about the sizes of couplers? Wheel flanges? How about the visible gear housing between steam engine driving wheels? Apart from a very few very large layouts, aren't our curve radii way too sharp? And the list goes on.

The question here is if whether by defining what "real" model railroading is supposed to be too narrowly, are we excluding and alienating too many potential members, including younger ones. After all, the name is National Model Railroad Association, not National Scale Model Railroad Association.

There's a lot of emotion around this issue. On the one hand, there is concern that to blur the boundaries defining what is basically a two-caste system of model railroading will dilute and potentially damage the great work that NMRA has done in defining standards and recommended practices. Without this model railroading would have never evolved into what it is today. On the other side, there are plenty of "anti-NMRA" modelers I've met who see us as elitist and condescending.

With that, I'll end my column for this time. Perhaps I'll hear from some of you about where the NMRA is or should be going.

As can be recognized by this requirement, the goal of the AP program is to encourage modelers to become proficient in many different areas. You must be able to prove (through the awarding of various AP certificates) that you have the ability to build quality scale models, scenery and/or structures, and construct, wire, or operate a layout and also provide service to the

hobby.

I have always been an advocate for the AP program because it challenges you to improve your skills and, in the process, get more out of the hobby. Maybe there is an aspect of the hobby that you just don't enjoy, such as electrical wiring of a layout. You can still participate in the hobby. However, if electrical work is a challenge that you want to master, you can use the AP program as a way of confronting that lack of knowledge or expertise and instead learn more about it. In the process, you can both improve your skills and complete the requirements for another AP certificate.

I am also pleased to announce that Mike Blumensaadt has been awarded a Certificate of Achievement for Volunteer. Congratulations Mike!

On 7-17-15 this truck arrived beside the prepared ground with everything except the concrete needed for the construction of Gus' officially large garage and shop.





thing at a time to the model so that the project does not seem overwhelmingly complicated and difficult.

Dave Turner showed his excitement over how he kitbashed an SP&S chip gon in exactly the same manner as the SP&S did, starting with removal of the roof of a USRA box car.

I used two motor cars and a caboose to tell the fictional back story about how my Colville, Republic and Palouse Railroad came into being, and how it got its herald. Gus Campagna invited those in attendance to come see the current state of construction on his huge, multi-deck California Western layout. These pictures will give you some idea of the magnitude and quality of this emerging layout. A lot has been accomplished in the first six months since the building interior was completed.

On 4-9-16 this was the state of what will be the crew lounge.

Mary's books will be shelved on the right. There is a refrigerator behind the photographer on the left, filled with what Gus considers to be the essentials of crew satisfaction—beer, hard cider, sodas, water and ice cream! The mineral brown wall on the left will be lettered to simulate a box car, and will feature a top-hung sliding door across the opening into the layout room.





On 6-3-16 this work train was seen coming off the Ten Mile Branch trestle and approaching the lift-out section across the opening between the layout room and the crew lounge. It would be a log train during Operations. Gus has put together four separate trains to use for testing his track work. Each has particular characteristics of its own, *vis a vis* car type, length, weight, etc. He runs them fast, slow, forward and backward through new track work. Then he tweaks any trouble spots until all four trains stay on the rails though all of their tests. Then the rail is ready for service!



Three days later track has been laid to the entrance of the helix, and MDF sub-roadbed is installed coming out of the helix and ready to support second deck trackage. The beginnings of the logging yard may be seen below the left side of the helix. This yard will be the end of the 10 mile branch out of Fort Bragg. The homosote roadbed in the left center is a link from the main line to the end of the 10 mile branch, and its sole function is to enable a continuous run when such is desired. It will not be used during Operations.







### The Answers Are Out There: Inglenook

Switching puzzles fall into at least two categories: realistic situations which might actually occur on a railroad sometime and contrived logic problems which incidentally use freight cars as props. Normally, I adore the former and despise the latter, but some actually fall on a spectrum between those two extremes. One such is a switching puzzle I came across recently which is very popular in the UK, but is virtually unknown in the US. It's called Inglenook, and it's much simpler in design than John Allen's famous Timesaver, which also falls on that spectrum between realistic and contrived. Inglenook employs just two turnouts and can fit into a space a few inches wide and no more than about a dozen model freight cars in length.

Here's the formula: a switching lead serves three stub-ended spurs through two turnouts (see the illustration above); 8 freight cars rest on the spurs, which hold 5, 3, and 3 cars, respectively; five of those cars are chosen at random, using dice, cards, or some other method; and a locomotive, starting on the switch lead, must put together a train consisting of those cars in the order in which they were chosen. What makes the situation unrealistic is that the switching lead holds a maximum of 3 freight cars

plus the locomotive.


To try to grasp the appeal of Inglenook, I tried it out on my kitchen table. I cut out 16 identical little rectangles from a 3x5 index card and colored them with felt pens, two each of eight different colors. Then I sketched the track arrangement on a sheet of paper and laid out eight of the "cars," one of each color, on two of the spurs. Next I chose five of the remaining duplicate cars at random and placed them in a line on the table beside the "yard" with its cars, to represent the desired order of the cars in the train. Then I set about switching the cars in the yard to build the required 5-car train.

not so difficult as to become frustrating—in short, it's a recipe for fun.

I doubt you'll need any help solving the illustrated problem, but here's my solution anyway:

- Pull track A, uncoupling behind car #5, and set car #5 on track C.
- Pull car #4 from track B and set cars 3 and 4 against 5 on C. (Notice that C is now full.)
- 3. Pull remaining cars from B and shove them onto A against the two already there.
- 4. Uncouple ahead of car #1, then pull A and set the two unnumbered cars onto B.
- 5. On A, cut ahead of #2 and set the unwanted car behind #1 against the cars on В.
- 6. Pull #2 from A; set 1 and 2 against the cars on C to form the train, ready to depart.

I found the task to be surprisingly addictive and I suddenly understood why so many Brits build versions of Inglenook for their homes and to display at train shows. Try it for yourself—I think you'll like it. It's challenging enough to be intriguing, but

### Tales of the Santa Cruz Northern - Model Railroadania

I don't know about you, but paper seems to stick to me. I mean, no matter how hard I try I always seem to come home from a convention, or an operating weekend, or even a visit to a friend's layout with stuff. Almost always paper stuff.

Copies of employee timetables are a favorite, but convention programs and clinic handouts are a strong second and third. In a separate category are napkins – with track plan sketches of course. Black and white

sometimes, the 'whateveritis' does get put to use in short order.

But, then again, most such railroadania, prototype or model, does not get used quickly. Some sits in a pile by my bedside table until I just can't stand it any more. Then it gets spread out on the bed and sorted. Or carried to the living room coffee table and spread. Sometimes only a

floor will do...

Some of this stuff seems to float around, defying logic and laws of nature, popping up at unexpected times and places - didn't I put that away already? I currently have a Milwaukee Road Empty Car Order Form from an operating weekend a year ago - I want to use it as a resource for making a new such form for the SCN. I will use it as an example. When will I get around to it? Not sure, but in the mean time it doesn't seem to have a place to be put. I guess I should be glad it keeps resurfacing!

And some of stuff just... disappears. Gone from sight, gone from mind. Filed, stuffed, misplaced, 'put in a safe place'. Maybe tucked away in a drawer just to get it out of sight before an op session.

Finding a pile / folder / box / drawer of such relics of an earlier age becomes an archeological dig of sorts and if you are lucky a time machine to one's past. I recently delved into a pair of folders while looking for something totally unrelated to what I eventually spent several hours digging though. The most challenging were two old, stained, stuck together teletype printouts – clearance forms with slow orders for two trains on the

Southern Pacific up in Oregon from the days I used to go up to Eugene to visit Rick Kang, Steve Gust and Garry Greenhaw who were dispatchers on the Oregon Division.

And buried deeper – amazing! Vegetable Northern Employee Timetables No. 1 and No. 2 for Rick's model of the Espee's Modoc Subdivision centered on Alturas. Fond memories for sure. This is where I first learned about operations. And just as Rick has always been my mentor when it came to operations, so I realize that his timetables provided the impetus and format for my own series of Santa Cruz



Northern timetables.

VN Timetable No. 2 consists of two 8.5"x11" pieces of paper, folded in half lengthwise. The outer page is printed on goldenrod paper and the inner, on white. Photocopied, of course. But the text, where it isn't a straight copy of pages from an SP timetable, is

typewritten, not computer generated. The track plan is hand drawn. Not surprising; looking at the front page the timetable was effective (dated) April 31, 1985. Over 30 years ago!

The text itself is a fascinating combination of [model] railroad humor and strict prototype rules as applied to a 1/87<sup>th</sup> scale railroad. Sam Wong, Rick's semi-mythical 'everyman' on the VN is variously listed on page two of the timetable as holding some dozen positions on the railroad, including General Manager, Superintendent, and more tongue in cheek: 'General Assistant', 'General General' and 'Vice Manager'.

Applying prototype rules to the model, Special Instructions deal specifically with placement of long and short cars in a train, tracks where certain equipment is restricted, placement of

helper locomotives. In instructions that we would now describe as 'adding to the play value' Rick includes several additions to Air Brake Rules. For example, the addition to Rule 24 states that air brake tests will be performed on all trains (forms for proper procedures were provided in the train packets).

My favorite though, it the additional special instruction for Rule 837: "Cars and locomotives must not be uncoupled nor coupled by hand. Use ramps where provided, else use Linton Picks." Yes, Rick, that is a pet peeve of mine too – and something I stress in my briefing before any operating session on the SCN. Even more interesting though is the confirmation that the ubiquitous picks or skewers that we have come to use to uncouple Kadee@ style couplers were in fact known

as "Linton Picks" among the operations oriented model railroaders in the Eugene, Oregon area in the late 1970's and early 1980's. Linton von Beroldingen himself says that he does not know if he was the first person to use a skewer or similar tool regularly to uncouple Kadee style knuckle couplers. But he certainly popularized their use in the Pacific Northwest Region and I brought the practice to the first version of the SCN as it began operations in the late 1970's. Linton wonders if the use of picks to uncouple Kadee style couplers developed independently elsewhere in the country. Nice to know, if we could ever figure it out. In the meantime I'm pleased to have copies of some VN railroad paper – it means as much or more to me as any of the prototype 'stuff' I have accumulated. 'Nuf said.
